There is no cost to members and spouses. The entrées and sides will be provided by the club, so you can bring a pot luck appetizer, salad, or dessert, and BYOB.



Horticultural Column

Nite Nite Veggie Garden: Winter Preparation of Our Vegetable Garden



With the cold wet weather, our vegetable gardens are shutting down. You can pick the last of the tomatoes and peppers, pull up the last carrots and even prepare fried green tomatoes. However, if you don't clean up the garden soon, then you will have a slimy mess.

Here is what I do in the winter veggie garden. First cut the plants off at ground level. You don't have to pull up the roots. As we have recently heard from several speakers, plant root systems contain beneficial fungi that help our plants take up nutrients from the

soil. Over Winter, the roots will break down and add additional organic matter to the bed.

Chop up the cut-down plants into smaller pieces and add them to your compost pile. If you don't have a compost pile – what is wrong with you?

Next, clean up any weeds that have grown over the summer. I put the weeds in my green waste can and let Redwood Empire do the composting to kill weed seeds.

Roll and tie up your drip irrigation tubing so it is out of the way.

Rake the beds smooth and you are ready to jump into spring planting on April 15th, after our final potential frost.

There are some options. My beds are filled with compost so that each year, the organics break down and the soil level drops. I add 1-2 inches of compost in the spring to bring the level up and add nutrients. When I don't have enough of my home-made compost, I add steer manure in the Winter. It is only \$1 a bag. By the time Spring comes around, the smell is gone and soil microbes have worked the organic additive into the soil. In Spring, you are ready to plant.

You can also use cover crops to add nutrients to the soil. Use something short, like clover, or for a big burst of nitrogen, plant fava beans. Note that they will get really tall and you will have to cut and compost the greens, or you can cut them down and decompose them right in the bed. For me, that is a little messy and not as easy as just adding my free compost or \$1-a-bag steer manure.

I love to look at of nice, clean, unplanted vegetable beds at during the winter. Plus, in Spring, it is a reminder to get going on the spring planting.

Doug mentioned how much we all appreciate lain Pryor's work on the monthly newsletter.

Nadya Clark spoke about how important the spring and fall plant sales are for funding the Club. Blooms Nursery, which has generously donated plants

for several years, suffered damage in the wildfire and may not be fully operational in time for the Spring Sale. Members are encouraged to divide and pot their own plants this fall for the upcoming sale. Add some composted manure to the remaining plant's hole.

As Membership Chair, Nadya requested that we renew as soon as possible to make the process move smoothly.

Bonnie Brown reminded us of the valuable Master Gardener talks that are held on Saturdays at Sonoma County Libraries.

Bill Klausing's Presentation:

Building a (Mostly) Native Habitat Garden

Sonoma County Master Gardener, Bill Klausing, is passionate about habitat gardening, which means focusing plant choices on what grows naturally in your specific locality and in the nearby areas. We have been losing habitat for birds, native bees, dragonflies and other species. If your neighbors also plant natives, together you will create a large enough habitat to support them. Your chemical-free landscape will be water-wise and beautiful.

He showed many slides of his beautiful, mostlynative Santa Rosa garden. He stressed the importance of



having a multi-seasonal succession of blooms to support all types of birds and insects. His calendar handout listed the bloom times for many plants. Having a five-year plan for developing the garden is the first step. Make your choices based on what the plant will do for the habitat garden. Plan for a diversity of true natives and some near-natives and Mediterranean plants. Have a diversity of bloom size and form, plus berries. Many wildflowers will self-seed. Grasses and shrubs provide good shelter. Do not mulch heavily everywhere, because bare ground is needed by some insect species. Plant native trees.
